BEDFORD COUNTY SPORTSMEN'S CLUB PISTOL LEAGUE SAFETY BRIEFING

- 1. PURPOSE. This will state the purpose of the current day's event. We have _____ certified Range Safety Officers (RSO) today. (Explain - what will be the course of fire for the event)
- 2. RANGE LAYOUT & LIMITS. Targets, Right & left limits, 180 degree rule, spectator area, ready area, firing points / or start box

3. RANGE SAFETY RULES

- a. GENERAL
 - i. Safety is the most important concern. All participants are safety officers. If you see something unsafe, you must address it or notify the proper Range officers.
 - ii. Know and obey all posted range rules.
 - iii. 3 fundamental safe gun handling rules
 - 1. Always keep you pistol pointed in a safe direction (down range, not in the air)
 - 2. Always keep your finger off the trigger until ready to fire
 - 3. Always keep your firearm unloaded until you are ready to use it
 - iv. Gun Ha<mark>ndling</mark>
 - 1. All firearms will be unloaded and holstered at all times except when shooting or in the designated ready area.
 - 2. After the stage of fire, your firearms must be "cleared" by the range officer.
 - 3. If shooting a semi auto, after your firearm is cleared by the range officer, place the safety on, release the slide, and drop the hammer.
 - 4. All firearms should be cased and unloaded prior to arriving at the range.

v. Equipment

- 1. Proper eye and ear protection must be worn at all times while on the range. This applies to non-shooters as well (especially when shooting or around steel targets)
- 2. Proper holsters are required. No "pocket" holsters.
- 3. Proper footwear and clothing is recommended, especially when shooting steel targets as pieces of the jacket could come back at the shooter. No flip flops or sandals on the range.
- vi. Targets
 - 1. Always shoot at authorized targets on the range. Never shoot at anything that is not a range target with the proper backstop. Bullets leaving the range area are the biggest concern to our range.

- 2. No glass, appliances, fixtures, pottery, etc targets on the range. All litter must be cleaned from the target areas.
- 3. Do not shoot at any buildings, cables, or target supports.
- vii. Control
 - 1. Always designate a Safety Officer when an RSO is not present.
 - 2. Stop shooting immediately when you here the command, "Cease Fire". Any one who observes an unsafe act may call a "Cease Fire".
- viii. Hygiene
 - 1. Shooter should refrain from eating, drinking, smoking, or placing hands in the proximity of the mouth while at shooting at the range.
 - 2. Change and wash clothing immediately after shooting to minimize exposure to airborne particulate lead residue.

b. SITE SPECIFIC RULES

- i. When firing from the covered firing bench area, the 180 degree rule is not in effect. The right & left limits are significantly reduced. Right limit is identified by the yellow marked pole and the left limit is the cement drain.
- ii. Automatic firearms or armor piercing ammunition is not allowed on the range.
- iii. All brass should be retrieved as much as possible when event is complete. No live rounds will be left on the range.
- iv. All equipment will be placed back into the range shed at the completion of the event.
- v. Steel targets must be placed so that a 30 degree safety buffer is established.
- vi. All steel targets and holders must be inspected prior to usage.
- vii. All trash shall be placed in the trash bin or taken with the shooter at the end of the event.

c. ADMINISTRATIVE RULES

- i. Range is open continuously. Night or twilight shooting must be approved by the Range Safety Officer or Range Owner.
- ii. All vehicles shall be parked away from the shooting area and behind the range limits.
- iii. The rifle/pistol range is closed during sanctioned ATA trap shoots.
- iv. Restroom facilities at the club house or beach area.
- v. Kitchen is open for food & drinks until approximately 1700 on Wednesdays.
- vi. Violation of the Range Rules or any repeated or serious safety violations may result in loss of shooting privileges on the range.

5. EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

- a. General

 - iii. Evaluate the situation
- c. Render Aid
 - i. Identify all first aid / CPR trained shooter
 - ii. Location of the 1st Aid kit
- d. Call for help
 - i. phone in the kitchen in the club house
 - ii. cell phones
- e. Direct help to location
 - i. Emergency vehicle keys in ignition
 - ii. Direct EMS from main road to scene
- f. Take notes
 - i. Will identify someone to take notes of the situation
